Rule of Thirds

Whenever possible, try to avoid placing your subject directly in the center of a photograph, which often creates a static feel. Using the rule of thirds will help create movement or eye-flow.

The **rule of thirds** is a compositional technique that places the main subject off-center for a more appealing picture. The photographer mentally divides the scene in the viewfinder into thirds, both horizontally and vertically, and then places the main subject along one of the imaginary lines or where two of the lines intersect.

HELPFUL TIPS

- » Ever wonder about the gridlines on Instagram? It's the rule of thirds. Next time on Instagram, try using the rule of thirds.
- » The rule of thirds can be achieved by moving or by waiting for the subject to move into that position.
- When using an autofocus camera, the rule of thirds will require you to focus on your subject matter and recompose the image before you take the photo.
- » Maximize eye-flow by making sure the subject of the photo is facing the center of the photo rather than the edge.



Dividing the image area into thirds vertically and horizontally guides the placement of the main subject. Where the lines intersect, visual "hot spots" are created. While the subject doesn't always have to be at the exact intersection of the lines, it is a general guideline to follow.



Using these grids as a guideline, carefully consider the placement of the subject in the frame. In many SLRs, there is a function that will display these lines as a reference.
